COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

DHS-FEMA Courses

E0146:

HOMELAND SECURITY EXERCISE EVALUATION **PROGRAM (HSEEP) COURSE**

The E0146 - HSEEP: Basic course provides a comprehensive overview of exercise design along with practical skill development. Using the same terminology and processes, this course will provide activities that will give participants an opportunity to interact with many of the templates and other materials that are detailed in the HSEEP doctrine created and maintained by the National Exercise Division to ensure exercises are conducted in a consistent manner. Target audience includes: Anyone planning to attend the Training & Exercise Symposium and who is a member of an exercise design team or fulfills a role in one of the following areas of the exercise design process: design, development, conduct, evaluation, or improvement planning for an exercise. Prereguisites: IS 120.a - An Introduction to Exercises (Required) and IS 130 - Exercise Evaluation and Improvement Planning (Recommended).

L-960:

NIMS All-Hazards Division/Group Supervisor (DIVS)

The course prepares students to perform in the role of the Division/Group Supervisor on an All Hazards Incident Management Team (AHIMT). It provides instruction in support of the specific tasks of the DIVS. Topics include DIVS management, organizational interaction, division operations, all-hazard operations, and tactical decision games. Prerequisites: Required: ICS - 100, 200, 300, and IS-700. Recommended: ICS- 400. AHIMT Course or C&G Local Training.

L-964:

NIMS All-Hazards Situation Unit Leader (SITL) As of 10/1/13, NWCG recognizes FEMA L964 as an equivalent to S-346, SITL. This course includes to prepare students to accomplish the duties & responsibilities of a situation unit leader (SITL). The course starts with how to activate, set up, organize, manage & demobilize a situation unit. It then addresses the products (maps, ICS-209, & other reports) the Situation Unit produces, as well as the technology that is needed to produce the products. One component of the pre-course work is for students to read & complete the exercises in Basic Land Navigation (NFES 2865). Prerequisites: required completion of IS-100, 200,700, 800 and ICS 300. ICS 400 course is recommended.

Skill Specific Courses

GPS:

GPS for Fire Management & ICS

This is a 16-24 hour course for fire and incident management staff providing advanced training in the use of GPS equipment for navigation and data collection. Course participants use GPS receivers to navigate, collect data that can be communicated in written or verbal formats, and download data to create files for use in a geographic information system (GIS) program, to meet the needs of GIS specialists, fire managers, or incident command staff. The use of GPS is one of the most efficient methods for documenting information regarding the location of facilities, conditions, and environments affected by Wildfire. Floods, Earthquakes, and other incidents. Prerequisites: Have knowledge and use of GPS receivers and software.

IBRW:

Incident Business Review Workshop

This review workshop is for students who have taken Online S-260 or would like to refresh their skills. Bring current Interagency Incident Business Management Handbook. This session includes questions and answers along with hands-on exercises. Prerequisites include: completion S-260 course onlie or classroom.

M&C:

Maps-n-Compass

This course provides the student with a basic level of knowledge and skills associated to land navigation with a map and compass. In addition, the use of GPS as a navigational supplement to maps and compass will be discussed. The orienteering course field exercise will provide students with the opportunity to practice skills and utilize classroom exercises. Prerequisites: None.

PEW: PTRC/EQTR Workshop

This workshop is a great opportunity for hands-on experience in Time module of e-ISuite for trainee and gualified EQTRs and PTRCs. Prerequisites: S-260 or online S-260 and S-261.

NWCG Courses

FI-210:

Fire Investigation Training

This course is designed to prepare an individual for basic fire investigation responsibilities in the area of origin and cause determination. Students successfully completing this course will receive full credit for FI-210 as required by NWCG certification standards. Prerequisites: Law Enforcement Officer or 1 year experience as a firefighter.

ICS-300:

POST Credit Intermediate ICS: ICS for Supervisors &

Expanding Incidents This course is designed to enable personnel to operate efficiently using the Incident Command System (ICS) in supervisory roles on expanding or Type 3 incidents. Topics include: ICS fundamentals review, incident/event assessment and agency guidance in establishing incident objectives, Unified Command, incident resources management, planning process, demobilization and incident transfer of command or close out. This course is National Incident Management System (NIMS) compliant. Prerequisites: ICS-200.

ICS-400: POST Credit Advanced ICS: ICS for Command & General

Staff & Complex Incidents This course directs the student towards an operational

understanding of large single-agency and complex multiagency/multi-jurisdictional incident responses. Topics include fundamentals review for command and general staff, major and/or complex incident/event management, area command. and multi-agency coordination. These courses are built on the same lesson objectives and content as the NWCG I-400 course and are interchangeable. Prerequisites: I-300, Intermediate ICS for Supervisors and Expanding Incidents.

L-280:

Followership to Leadership

This training course is designed as a self-assessment opportunity for individuals preparing to step into a leadership role. The course combines one day of classroom instruction followed by a second day in the field with students working through a series of problem solving events in small teams (Field Leadership Assessment Course). Topic areas include: Leadership values and principles; transition challenges for new leaders; situational leadership; team cohesion factors; and ethical decision-making. Prerequisites: Experience on incident assignments in operations or support functions & L-180.

L-380:

Fireline Leadership

This course also known as "At the Point of the Spear: Leading and preparing emergency response units "(DHS CA-002PREV) is a 36-hour program that focuses on helping response leaders build more cohesive, adaptive, and resilient teams. This program teaches principles for leading in high-risk and high-stress environments, building team cohesion, and resolving conflicts and problems within the team. Using a mix of theory, classroom exercises, and field exercises, this interactive program is designed to reinforce mission-driven operational culture at the team level and to provide a framework from which to launch future organizational development. More than 50 agencies and departments rely on this program for first-line leader development. Prerequisites: Incident personnel with supervisory responsibilities; Human Factors in the Wildland Fire Service (L-180); completion of pre-course work. Sponsored by CO Division of Fire Prevention & Control..

S-130/190:

Firefighting Training & Intro to Wildland Fire Behavior

This introductory course is designed to train entry-level firefighters referred to as a Firefighter Type 2 (FFT2). You will be introduced to and gain knowledge of the basic incident management organization, firefighting techniques, suppression equipment, safety, strategy/tactics along with fire behavior. Field exercises will be performed for valuable hands-on training. Includes L-180 and I-100. Prerequisites: None.

S-130/190 (Online): **Review & Field Day ONLY!**

This two-day class assists those students taking the online S-130/190 course with the necessary classroom review & field work to successfully complete the class for NWCG certification. Prerequisites: Successful completion of online S-130/190 modules with academy instructor.

S-131: NEW REVISION FIREFIGHTER TYPE 1 (2016)

Firefighter Type 1, S-131, is now a twelve-hour course designed to meet the training needs of the Firefighter Type 1 (FFT1) and/or Incident Commander Type 5 (ICT5). This course is designed to be interactive in nature. It contains class discussion and several tactical decision games designed to facilitate learning the objectives. Topics include operational leadership, communications, LCES and tactical decision making. Prerequisites: Qualified as a firefighter type 2 (FFT2).

S-200: Initial Attack Incident Commander

The intent of this course is to provide students with the tools and techniques to make the transition from Single Resource Boss to Incident Commander. Prerequisites: Qualified as any Single Resource Boss (SRB).

S-211:

Portable Pumps & Water Use

This course is designed to provide knowledge and skills to design, setup, operate, troubleshoot, and shut down portable water delivery systems. The focus is on portable pumps – it does not address water delivery for engines. Topics covered include: portable water delivery systems; equipment; roles and responsibilities; and system design and hydraulics. There is also a field exercise where students will apply what they learned in the classroom. Prerequisites: None.

S-212: Wildfire Powersaws

This class is designed to train students in the proper use of chainsaws and techniques necessary to prepare them for their functional role as a chainsaw operator on an incident. Class A and B certification is available with this 5-day class & field (based on evaluation). Prerequisites: Qualified as FFT2 and current certification in Basic First Aid & CPR.

S-215:

Fire Operations in the Wildland/Urban Interface

This course is designed to assist initial attack incident commanders and company officers in confronting wildland fires that threaten life, property and improvements. Prerequisites: Agency personnel must be Firefighter Type 1 (FFT1) qualified. Structural Fire Department personnel should have completed Intro to ICS(I-100),Human Factors on the Fireline (L-180), Firefighter Training & Intro to Wildland Fire Behavior (S-130/190), and Firefighter Type 1 (S-131); or equivalent training.

S-219: Firing Operations

This course introduces the roles and responsibilities of a Firing Boss (FIRB) to qualified FFT2 and FFT1 and outlines duties of other personnel who may engage in a firing operation. The course discusses and illustrates common firing devices and techniques. Although comprehensive in nature, the course work is not a substitute for the dynamic fire environment. The course provides students with important information regarding general tasks required to be successful. Replaces S-234, Ignition Operations. Prerequisites: a minimum of FFT2 qualified and RT-130. Students seeking FIRB certification must successfully complete, ICS-200, S-230, S-290 and RT-130.

S-230:

Crew Boss (Single Resource)

This course is designed to meet the training needs of a crew boss on an incident. Units include preparation, mobilization, tactics & safety, off-line duties, demobilization and post incident responsibilities. Prerequisites: S-290 & FFT1 qualified.

S-231:

Engine Boss (Single Resource)

This course provides single resource boss training relevant to the engine boss position. You will identify crew and engine capabilities; gather information for assignments, communicate & coordinate effectively with crew members. Prerequisites: S-230 & FFT1 qualified.

S-236:

Heavy Equipment Boss (Single Resource)

This is a skill course is designed to meet the training needs of a Heavy Equipment Boss on an incident as outlined the PMS 310-1 and the Position Task Book developed for the position. Primary considerations are tactical use and safety precautions required to establish and maintain an effective dozer operation. A field exercise is required as part of the course. Prerequisites: includes completion of pre-course work (2 hours) and Qualified as firefighter type 1 (FFT1).

S-248: Status/Check-in Recorder

This course is designed to introduce students to the tools and techniques used to perform the duties of a status check-in recorder (SCKN). The course provides an overview of what a student can expect if dispatched to an incident using elsuite. Prerequisites: It is recommended that students have completed Basic ICS (ICS-200) and Human Factors (L- 180), and have basic computer skills in the Windows environment.

S-261: Applied Interagency Incident Business Management

This course is designed to provide the prerequisite skills/ knowledge necessary to perform the task of the entry-level finance positions for commissary manager, personnel time recorder, equipment time recorder, compensation for injury specialist and claims specialist. Prerequisites: S-260.

S-270: Basic Air Operations

This course offers information on the uses of aircraft in fire suppression and provides instruction on how to conduct oneself in and around aircraft. It will familiarize the trainee with tactical and logistical uses of aircraft in fire suppression, as well as, describe the specifications for helicopter landing areas. Prerequisites: None.



Students in S-211, Pumps & Water, Using Foam

S-290:

Intermediate Wildland Fire Behavior

This fire behavior course provides students with the knowledge of wildland fuels and fire behavior to make safe and effective fire management decisions on prescribed and wildland fires. Prerequisites: S-130/190.

S-330:

Task Force/Strike Team Leader

This course meets the training requirements for the positions of Task Force and Strike Team Leader. The course is designed to be interactive with several scenarios and exercises specific to wildland fire suppression. Prerequisites: Qualified as any Single Resource Boss; completion of pre-course work.

S-339:

Division/Group Supervisor

This course prepares students to perform in the role of division/group supervisor. It provides instruction in support of the specific tasks of the division/group supervisor, but will not instruct students in general management/supervision or in the incident command system (ICS), both of which the student should learn through prerequisite work. Topics include division/group management, organizational interaction, division operations, all-hazard operations, & tactical decision games. Prerequisites: Qualified as a (TFLD) OR qualified as an incident commander type 3 (ICT3) OR qualified as an incident commander type 4 (ICT4) & in any two strike team leader positions (one must be STCR or STEN).
