



- What:** 40-hour class based upon IFSTA “Fire and Emergency Services Company Officer,” 5<sup>th</sup> edition, designed to prepare the student to complete the job performance requirements (JPRs) contained in NFPA 1021, *Standard for Fire Officer Professional Qualifications* (2009) for the position of Fire Officer, level I. This class includes about 20 hours of classroom instruction, two JPRs completed as pre-course work, nine JPRs completed during the class and the remaining four JPRs finished after the class.
- Who:** The target audience includes current and future company/chief officers seeking Colorado Division of Fire Prevention & Control (DFPC) certification. The minimum prerequisite qualification for this course is state-certified Firefighter II and Fire Instructor I. DFPC certification as Fire Officer I additionally requires current Hazardous Materials Operations and Emergency Medical Service First Responder or higher EMS certification.
- When:** October 31 – November 2, 2019 (Thurs.-Sat.) and November 7-8, 2019 (Thurs.-Fri.). Running 0800 - 1700 all days. Students can expect a rigorous schedule, comprised of classroom instruction, JPR exercises, and additional nightly reading/project assignments.
- Where:** Colorado Firecamp at the Ponderosa Lodge, 12 miles west of Salida, ½ mile north of U.S. Highway 50 at 9008 County Road 240.
- Why:** DFPC allows Fire Officer I JPRs to be evaluated within an approved training course, as an alternative to a candidate submitting a single documentation portfolio of all 15 JPRs.
- Cost:** \$650 — includes tuition, 3 nights of lodging, and meals. A reduced charge is offered to member agencies of the Upper Arkansas Valley Wildfire Council and Headwaters Fire Training Officers Association. Students are responsible for providing their own manuals.
