

S-215 Fire Operations in the Wildland / Urban Interface

Colorado wildfires such as Waldo Canyon (2012), Cameron Peak (2020), East Troublesome (2020), and High Park (2012) and most recently, the Marshall Fire have claimed six lives, 2,740 structures, and 508,256 acres in the last 10 years. *Northern Colorado Firefighters are on the front lines of the battles in the Wildland / Urban Interface.* This course provides the student with the skills and knowledge to operate safely and effectively in a wildland/urban interface incident by using situation awareness, performing structure triage, using pre-planning tools, having a basic understanding of fire behavior, and using strategy and tactics unique to the wildland/urban interface environment.
