Attached to this email you find three informational memos regarding changes to the Division of Fire Prevention and Control's Certification Program. These changes were suggested by the Colorado Fire Training Officers Association, approved by the Governor's Fire Service Training and Certification Advisory Board and approved by Director Cooke.

A brief synopsis of each informational memorandum is listed below:

13-05: Fire Instructor I Renewal Changes: Within the criteria of the renewal process for Fire and Emergency Service Instructor I, there is currently a requirement for incumbents to complete twelve (12) hours of continuing education in instruction techniques during the certification period. At the recommendation of the Colorado Fire Training Officers Association and the Governor's Colorado Fire Service Training and Certification Advisory Board, this requirement will no longer be in effect for Fire and Emergency Service Instructor I certifications **expiring on or after July 1, 2014.**

<u>13-06: Driver Operator Prerequisites</u>: Within the criteria of the certification process for the Driver Operator certification is a prerequisite for the candidate to be currently certified as Fire Fighter I. At the recommendation of the Colorado Fire Training Officers Association and the Governor's Colorado Fire Service Training and Certification Advisory Board, this prerequisite will no longer be required. This policy will go into effect for Driver Operator certifications and renewals issued <u>on or</u> <u>after July 1, 2014.</u>

13-07: JPR Renewal Performance Outcome: Within the criteria of the renewal process for all certifications that require completion of JPRs, there is currently a requirement for incumbents to *"complete 100% of the JPRs including all subsections"*. At the recommendation of the Colorado Fire Training Officers Association and the Governor's Colorado Fire Service Training and Certification Advisory Board, this requirement will be changed to allow scenario based training for completion of the JPR performance requirements. These training scenarios will tie many of the task-level JPRs together to develop more fluid evolutions on the training ground. Training officers will be able to observe their personnel demonstrating multiple JPR proficiencies during training exercises rather than proficiency of a single JPR to include all task steps and subsections.

This policy will go into effect for all certifications requiring completion of 100% of the JPRs **expiring on or after July 1, 2014.**

Within the criteria of the certification process for the Driver Operator l certification is a prerequisite for the candidates to be currently certified as Fire Fighter I. At the recommendation of the Colorado Fire Training Officer's Association and the Governor's Colorado Fire Service Training and Certification Advisory Board, this prerequisite will no longer be required. This policy will go into effect for Driver Operator certifications and renewals issued <u>on or after July 1, 2014</u>. The CDFPC Policy and Procedure Manual will reflect this change as shown below:

9.11.1: Driver Operator Initial Certification Requirements

- 9.11.1.1: Meet requirements in NFPA 1002;
- 9.11.1.2: Must be affiliated with a Colorado Emergency Services Agency;
- 9.11.1.3: Pass Written Examination
 - 80% of 50 question examination
- 9.11.1.4: Pass Practical Examination
 - Mandatory and Randomly selected Job Performance Requirements (JPRs)
 - 100% of practical examination
- 9.11.1.5: Written and practical examinations are obtained from the CDFPC.
- 9.11.1.6: Must possess current Colorado State Driver's License.

9.11.3: Driver Operator Renewal Requirements:

- 9.11.3.1: Renewal documentation shall be submitted to the CDFPC no earlier than 90 days prior to the expiration date and received/postmarked no later than 90 days after the expiration date, submitted on the Scantron™ form, including the Department Head/Designee signature.
- 9.11.3.2: The Department Head/Designee by signing the renewal documentation is attesting to:
 - 9.11.3.2.1: The applicant holds a current Colorado Driver Operator certification;
 - 9.11.3.2.2: The applicant is affiliated with a Colorado Emergency Services Agency;
 - 9.11.3.2.3: The applicant has successfully demonstrated proficiency in all of the skill evolutions identified for the level of certification by having been observed, tested and evaluated by a <u>person certified at or above this level</u> completing 100% of all JPRs. The applicant must meet the performance outcome in each JPR;
 - 9.11.3.2.4: Appropriate local records are maintained documenting completion of requirements;
 - 9.11.3.2.5: The applicant meets or exceeds the professional qualifications listed in the NFPA 1002.

<u>Note:</u> The prerequisite for Fire Fighter I Certification will remain as a requirement for Driver Operator Pumper and Driver Operator Aerial.

Old Language:

The applicant has successfully demonstrated proficiency in all of the skill evolutions identified for the level of certification by having been observed, tested and evaluated by a person certified at or above this level completing 100% of all JPRs including all subsections;

New Language:

The applicant has successfully demonstrated proficiency in all of the skill evolutions identified for the level of certification by having been observed, tested and evaluated by a person certified at or above this level completing 100% of all JPRs. <u>The applicant must meet the performance outcome in each JPR;</u>



Latest News on Wildland Fire Program's Transition to DLA

On May 1, GSA will re-assign approximately 300 National Stock Numbers (NSNs) that comprise its Wildland Fire program to the Defense Logistics Agency (DLA). The key facts listed below act as a reminder of this transition and a guide to assist you with ordering after May 1.

- The affected NSNs will not be available through traditional GSA ordering mechanisms after May 1. The GSA Global Supply[™] and GSAAdvantage![®] websites will not display those NSNs or accept orders for them.
- The GSA-USDA Interagency Agreement is in effect through the 2014 fire season while a new DLA-USDA agreement is developed.
- Federal customers can use DOD EMALL to order directly from DLA. State and local agencies may
 place orders through GSA during the 2014 fire season. Those orders will be conveyed to DLA for
 fulfillment. Detailed ordering options for state and local agencies are posted at
 gsa.gov/fireprogram.
- The Wildland Fire transition occurring May 1 applies only to NSNs GSA has traditionally stocked in its Western Distribution Center. Customers who want to buy fire-related items from GSA Schedule vendors may continue to do so. Please note that while Multiple Award Schedule 84 purchases could be a work-around for state and local activities, that approach would result in both higher costs and longer delivery times.

Information and transition documents on the Wildland Fire program have been posted at gsa.gov/fireprogram. Further updates will be added to that page.

Ordering Instructions for Wildland Fire Items Starting May 1, 2014

State and Local Agencies - ONLY

During the 2014 fire season, state and local agencies will place orders for Wildland Fire items through GSA using one of the methods below:

- 1. Email to FireCacheOrder@gsa.gov
- 2. Fax to (817) 574-2551
- Telephone (800) 525-8027, Option 3* (<u>Not</u> option 1, GSA's standard order number)

In all cases, ordering agencies will need to provide:

- Activity Address Code
- Shipping address
- NSN and Quantity for each item

Note that GSA will forward each order to DLA for fulfillment. DLA will ship products to customers and GSA will bill customers after DLA has confirmed shipment.

The ordering process listed above is an interim process that will remain in effect through the 2014 fire season. Between now and the start of the 2015 fire season, DLA and the Forest Service will develop a long-term solution.

Federal Civilian Customers

Federal civilian customers (e.g. USDA, Interior) will place orders directly with DLA:

- 1. DOD EMALL (method of payment can be government purchase card or direct billing via valid AAC)
- 2. FEDSTRIP requisition agencies with a direct method of submitting a FEDSTRIP requisition may do so.

Note that GSA has no role in these transactions so payment will be made directly to DLA to ensure timely order fulfillment.

1. MILSTRIP- Military Services must follow current service ordering procedures (e.g. Army's SARSS, Air Force's ILSS, etc.)
